Summer School & Rec and Read A Major Success!

Once again, we had many students who moved up several reading levels during our Rec and Read Programs this Summer!

In Summer School, we also had more students doing academic course completion and many students completed entire courses. Thanks to Bruce Relland for his work as our Summer School Administrator/Teacher.

Rec & Read is an early intervention, literacy program for children, who are currently in grades one to three, who will benefit from additional reading development over the summer. The program balances literacy instruction with recreational activities. The morning consists of literacy centres (including writing activities) and small group and individual instruction in guided reading. In the afternoon, participants engage in on-site recreational activities. Rec & Read was developed based on sound research using best practices. This is a 4-week program from June 30 - July 24, 2025. The Recreation Leader is responsible for the afternoon portion of the program, working approximately 2.5 hours per day, Monday through Thursday. They also participate in small group assisted reading assistance in the morning session.
















Update from teacher, Savannah Bergenhenegouwen:













Upcoming
